In March, the Town Council will begin to discuss and develop the Town's operating and capital budgets for the FY15 fiscal year, which begins on July 1, 2014 and continues through June 30, 2015.

At its regular monthly meeting on **Wednesday, March 12**, the Town Council will hold a special public comment period to hear from residents about next year's budget and which new or ongoing initiatives they would like to see funded. Following this meeting, the Council will hold a work session on **Wednesday, March 26** to review the proposed budget that the staff and Treasurer have prepared.

Another discussion of the budget will occur at the **Wednesday, April 9** Council meeting, at which time residents will again be able to speak on the budget during the public comment portion of the meeting. There will be a public hearing on the final proposed budget at the Annual Meeting on **Tuesday, May 6**, before the Council adopts the budget at the **Wednesday, June 11** Council meeting.

Throughout the budget development process, the Town Council will consider many of the ideas proposed by residents during the recent public forums on use of the Town's reserve funds. The Council also will determine the amount of reserve monies to set aside for a "rainy day" fund and for future capital expenditures.

Council Retains Purple Line Assistance

At a special meeting on February 20, the Town Council voted to retain the firm of Buchanan Ingersoll & Rooney and its subcontractors Alexander & Cleaver and Chambers, Conlon & Hartwell to provide legal and government relations services to the Town of Chevy Chase to assist the Town in continuing to address the proposed Purple Line project. The Council authorized the expenditure of \$29,000 per month for the services, up to a maximum of \$350,000.

Town Elections

Town Elections are governed by the provisions in Chapter 8 of the Town of Chevy Chase Municipal Code:

“...an election shall be held on the first Tuesday in May of each year to elect members of the Town Council. Three (3) members shall be elected in even numbered years and two (2) members in the odd numbered years.”

Town residents will select three candidates in the 2014 election, each to serve on the Council for a two year term.

NOMINATIONS ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible for nomination, a resident must have resided in the Town for at least one year immediately preceding the election and be a registered voter in the State of Maryland, Town of Chevy Chase.

NOMINATING PROCEDURES

Residents are encouraged to present by petition their names or those of Town residents who are willing to serve on the Town Council. Blank petitions are available in the Town Office, 4301 Willow Lane, 301-654-7144.

Petitions must contain the following information: the candidate's name, address, occupation, length of residency in the Town, a short biographical sketch and a short statement (limit to 400 words or less), confirmation of willingness to serve if elected, and the endorsing signatures, addresses and telephone numbers of at least five persons, other than the candidate, eligible to vote in the above election.

Petitions must be delivered to the Town Office before 5 p.m. on April 15, 2014, the third Tuesday preceding the election, in order for the candidate's name to appear on the printed ballot.

Petitions may be inspected at the Town Hall on **Tuesday, April 15** between the hours of 5 p.m. – 6 p.m. Any challenges to the petitions or the persons signing the petitions must be made in writing and delivered to the Election Board at the Town Office no later than 9 a.m. on **Wednesday, April 16**. The Election Board may make additional nominations and must do so if an insufficient number of candidates have been nominated by petition to ensure that at least one candidate is nominated for each opening on the Town Council.

CANDIDATES FORUM or MEET AND GREET

If the election is contested, the candidates will be invited to participate in a moderated forum and dialogue with the community on **Thursday, April 24** at 7 p.m. in the Town Hall. The Election Board will accept questions in advance from Town residents. If the election is uncontested, the candidates will be invited to participate in a meet and greet event.

FLOOR NOMINATIONS

Nominations from the floor cannot be considered at the Annual Meeting on Tuesday, May 6, 2014 since voting will begin in advance of the meeting.

WRITE-IN CANDIDATES

There will be appropriate blanks on the printed ballot for the purpose of adding write-in candidates at the time of the election.

NOTICE OF NOMINATIONS

The name, a short biographical sketch and short statement (not to exceed 400 words) of all candidates will be mailed to all residents two weeks preceding the election.

FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE

Council members and candidates for office are required to submit annual financial disclosure statements. The financial disclosure statement will be available for review at the Town Office by March 1.

VOTING ELIGIBILITY

A resident must be a citizen of the United States, at least eighteen years of age, have resided within the corporate limits of the Town for thirty days preceding the Town election and be a registered, qualified voter of the State of Maryland, Town of Chevy Chase to be eligible to vote.

POLL LOCATION AND HOURS

The poll will be located in the Town Hall, 4301 Willow Lane. The poll will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on **Election Day, Tuesday, May 6, 2014**.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Absentee ballots will be available in the Town Office on **Tuesday, April 22** at 12 p.m. Any qualified voter may vote by absentee ballot. Residents desiring an absentee ballot must apply individually in writing (by mail, fax, email or in person) to the Town Office. Once an absentee ballot request has been received, the Town will mail or hand deliver a ballot and return envelope to the requestor in a sealed envelope. To be counted, the absentee ballot must be returned to the Town Office in the printed envelope provided by the Town by 8 p.m. on **Election Day, Tuesday, May 6, 2014**.

A Message from Mayor Pat Burda

I want to thank all of you who attended the recent public forums to offer your opinions on ways the Town could use its reserve funds. There was a very good turnout, with over 150 residents attending, and we received very thoughtful comments and suggestions. The Town's Long Range Planning Committee is currently reviewing these comments and will present a report to the Town Council at the [Wednesday, March 12](#) Council meeting. The Council will then use this report to guide development of the FY15 budget.

While the Council may be able to include funds in next year's budget to support many of your ideas, some proposals will need more thorough analysis to determine their feasibility, desirability and cost. In addition, the Council will need to ensure that any recommended programs or services further a public purpose, benefit a significant number of Town residents, and are something a town government can accomplish, either legally or otherwise.

As detailed on page one, the FY15 budget process is underway, and I invite you to attend the public meetings that will be held over the next few months.

Town Updates

Household Organic Waste Collection Program a Success

Since household organic waste collection service began on Tuesday, January 7, Town residents have composted approximately 5,700 pounds of organic waste! Residents may choose to participate in this program at any time by contacting the Town Office by the last Tuesday of any month. Compost Crew will deliver a five gallon bin to your house on the first Tuesday of the following month, with service beginning the following Tuesday. Collection is every Tuesday. To guarantee collection, residents should place their bin at the curb by 7 a.m. Each week, the contractor wipes out the bin, replaces the liner and returns the bin to the curb. Native Canopy & Street Tree Plantings

The Town is finalizing the tree planting list for April. If you have a spot in your yard suitable for a canopy tree, you might want to take advantage of the Native Canopy Tree Planting program. Under this program, the Town will purchase and install a canopy tree on your property at no cost to you. Residents are responsible for the long-term care of the tree once installed.

You may also request to have a tree planted along the street in front of your home. The Town prefers to plant canopy trees when possible. Once the trees are planted, the town will care for the trees for the first year by ensuring that they are watered.

Public Tree Edging and Mulching

Throughout the month of March, the Town's contractor will edge and mulch all street and park trees that are 10" or less in diameter.

Council Seeks Volunteers for Power Reliability Task Force

The Town is seeking resident volunteers to serve on the newly-formed Power Reliability Task Force, which will explore options for improving the reliability of electrical service within the Town. At its February meeting, the Town Council approved organizing this task force to explore a broader range of options to address power outages. The Town will continue to work with PEPCO to explore undergrounding utility lines (*see article below*).

The Task Force will consist of residents with interest and expertise related to this topic. David Lublin will serve as the Town Council liaison to the group, which is charged with developing a report with recommendations for consideration by the Town Council.

The Task Force will examine what steps Pepco has or is planning to take to enhance reliability in the Town and what additional actions might be undertaken to reduce the number and length of power outages during future weather events. Additionally, with Council approval, the Task Force may engage outside experts, as needed, to fully evaluate the costs and effectiveness of options for improving reliability.

PEPCO Provides Preliminary Estimate for Undergrounding Utility Lines

At its February meeting, the Town Council discussed PEPCO's preliminary cost estimate for undergrounding electrical lines in Town. PEPCO agreed to provide this estimate at the request of the Town Council during the Public Meeting on Undergrounding Utility Lines that was held in December.

PEPCO officials estimate that burying the Town's power lines would cost approximately \$50 million, not including any costs associated with undergrounding telecommunication lines, any upgrade work required by the customer, or installation of new street lights. According to PEPCO, costs incurred by each customer would range from \$5,000 to \$15,000 for meter box upgrades, burying service wires between the right-of-way and a residence, and internal electrical upgrades, if needed.

PEPCO has agreed to provide the Town with a more refined cost estimate, following a survey and inventory of the Town's electrical infrastructure, as well as an estimate to perform a detailed engineering study. More information will be provided in subsequent editions of the newsletter.

Maryland Updates Smoke Alarm Law Important Information for Residents

- Maryland's new smoke alarm law requires the replacement of all battery-only operated smoke alarms with units powered by sealed-in 10 year long-life batteries.
- All smoke alarms have expiration dates. Both hard-wired and battery-operated smoke alarms need to be replaced every ten years. If your smoke alarm has not been replaced since 2003, it's time!
- Location, location, location- smoke alarms are required to be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home including basements (finished or unfinished).
- For homes constructed since 1994, smoke alarms have been required inside all sleeping rooms. For maximum protection, fire officials recommend installing smoke alarms in sleeping rooms regardless of the year of construction.
- Homeowners have until January 1, 2018 to comply with the new law. Any resident requiring information or assistance can call 3-1-1.

Folksinger Peggy Seeger will reminisce about growing up in Chevy Chase and sing a few tunes in a Chevy Chase Historical Society program for the community on **Saturday, March 15** at 4 p.m. The program, "Memories and Melodies: Peggy Seeger in Conversation with Mary Cliff," will be held at the Chevy Chase Village Hall, 5906 Connecticut Avenue, across the street from the Queen Anne house where Peggy Seeger lived in the 1940s and '50s.

Her father, folklorist and musicologist Charles Seeger; her mother, modernist composer Ruth Crawford Seeger; her brother, Mike Seeger, and her half-brother, Pete Seeger, helped spark the folksong revival in mid-20th century America. Peggy Seeger has lived in Britain for more than 30 years and was married to singer and songwriter Ewan MacColl before his death. MacColl wrote "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face" about her. Mary Cliff, friend of the Seegers and longtime radio host of the "Traditions" folk music show now heard on WAMU's Bluegrass Country program, will talk with Peggy Seeger about her years in Chevy Chase and her subsequent music career.

TRASH AND TREASURES

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY!



The Town's spring Trash and Treasures is scheduled for the weekend of **Saturday, April 5 and Sunday, April 6**. The Town offers this bulk trash pickup so that residents can dispose of items that are no longer usable, such as appliances (doors must be removed for safety), furniture, rolled rugs, mattresses, games and bikes, but, if the items are usable, we encourage you to review the list of **Alternatives to Trash and Treasures**. GUIDELINES

Please Remember To Bag, Box Or Contain All Of Your Discards.

Please Do Not Put Items On The Curb Before Friday Afternoon, April 4.

The Following Items Will Not Be Picked Up:

- NO construction debris
- NO parts of junked automobiles (engines, transmissions), boats or trailers
- NO loose glass of any kind
- NO firewood or fencing of any kind
- NO paint cans
- NO flammable or hazardous liquids or solids
- NO recyclable items, such as newspapers, mixed paper or cardboard, landscape pots, old books and magazines, large plastic bins - please recycle!
- NO shrubbery cuttings, yard clippings, leaves or grass – recycle with yard trash!

If you have questions about how to discard any of these items, please call the Town Office at 301-654-7144. We will be happy to help you arrange a special pick-up for items that are not included in Trash and Treasures. There will be a charge for a special pickup.

PICK UP SCHEDULE: At 7 a.m., **Monday, April 7**, a crew will begin clearing feeder streets to Chevy Chase Elementary School. During non-rush hours, the peripheral streets will be cleared. After these priority streets are cleared, the truck will proceed according to a schedule arranged with the Town Manager. An account of daily progress will be kept in the Town Office. Once a street has been cleared, the contractor will *not* return to that street. Residents who discard items after the street has been cleared will have to arrange for a special pick-up – for a fee.

Hazardous Waste Disposal

The Household Hazardous Waste receiving area at the Shady Grove Solid Waste Transfer Station is located in the recycling drop-off section of the Public Unloading Area, 16101 Frederick Rd, Derwood, MD 20855. Please use the Car Entrance to the facility. The drop-off is open: Monday - Friday, 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Saturday, 7 a.m. – 5 p.m. and Sunday, 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. Household Hazardous Waste can only be received during these hours -- please do not drop off this material at other times. Batteries are accepted (alkaline batteries may be put in regular trash), fertilizers with herbicides, fluorescent light tubes and bulbs, including CFLs, herbicides, insecticides, mercury containing items, oil-based paints, paint thinners, pesticides, used motor oil and most other oils.
