Vote on November 6!!

Election Day is Tuesday, November 6 -- less than a week away. Voting takes place in the cafeteria of Chevy Chase Elementary School. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Meanwhile, early voting began on October 25 at the Lawton Center and continues through November 1. On our ballots will be a number of important races: U.S. Senate and House, Maryland Governor, State Senate and House of Delegates, County Executive and County Council.

My colleagues on the Town Council and I urge every registered voter in Town to get out and vote this year. We traditionally say that we have the "right to vote," but I fear that if left expressed that way, one could decide to exercise it or not, as one might choose. But with the temper of the times in our own country, and with authoritarianism on the rise in so many nations -- even those only released from dictatorship in our lifetimes -- we must see voting as more than a right: it's how we make the statement that ours is a robust democracy belonging to an engaged people. And it's how we express faith in our system of government. So, let's show ourselves, show our elected representatives, show the world, that we care enough to nurture the values of our political system. Let's care enough to vote.

Safer Streets

My colleagues and I have taken note of a large number of messages, posted online and sent to the Town office, expressing concern about speeding on our streets. What led to these comments was the report of a serious accident between a car and a bicyclist at the intersection of Leland and Oak. We will discuss this issue at our November Town Council meeting; but our Town Manager has already requested our police to spend more time on the streets that appear to be of greatest concern -- and be prepared to issue citations, both to cars and speeding bicyclists who ignore Town traffic signs. We also are considering a project to expand the signage in Town. Further, our new speed bump policy is in effect, and residents can follow that policy to have an assessment of whether a speed bump is applicable for a particular stretch of road. Finally, upon completion of the current infrastructure program at the end of next summer, we will undertake a systematic study of traffic flows, volumes and speeds in Town.

TOWN UPDATES

Holiday Trash Collection

Household trash will not be collected on Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, November 22, but will be collected on your next regularly scheduled trash day.

Leaf Collection

Leaf collection has begun and will continue through mid-December. Please rake leaves to the edge of the curb to be vacuumed. Leaves must be free of debris such as sticks, bottles, cans and rocks. A map of the leaf collection schedule can be found on the Town website.




Permit Parking Enforcement

Due to increased complaints about non-resident parking in the Town’s permit parking areas, the Town has asked police to step up enforcement and issue citations to vehicles not displaying a valid parking permit. Residents in permit parking areas should ensure that their vehicles display a valid permit parking sticker and that all visitors’ vehicles display a valid guest pass.

Rat Control

If you suspect that there are rats on your or your neighbor’s property, we recommend that you first visit the Montgomery County website (www.montgomerycountymd.gov; search “rats”), which provides useful information about effective means of rat control. If you determine that there is indeed a problem, you may contact the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services at 240-777-3986 to schedule a no cost appointment with an inspector. The inspector will look for evidence of rat activity and recommend a course of action to address the problem.

Residents can take steps to control rodents by securing trash cans, inspecting wood and compost piles, and eliminating pet waste and other food sources. Please contact the Town office at 301-654-7144 if you would like a hard copy of the information posted on the County website.



History of Washington's Grand Department Stores

The Chevy Chase Historical Society (CCHS) invites local residents to an illustrated lecture, "**The Glory Days of Washington's Grand Department Stores: A Nostalgic Look Back,**" on Sunday, November 18, at 4 p.m. at the Jane Lawton Community Center, 4301 Willow Lane, in the Town of Chevy Chase.

Michael Lisicky, author of 11 books about once-iconic department stores including Gimbles in New York, Wanamaker's in Philadelphia, Filene's in Boston and "Woodies" in Washington, D.C. and Chevy Chase, will be the featured speaker. He will focus on Woodward and Lothrop, Garfinkel's, Hecht's and other now-shuttered D.C. stores, beloved for their elaborate holiday window displays, wedding services and Tea Room specialties.

A reception of light refreshments will follow Lisicky's talk. Copies of his 2013 book, "Woodward and Lothrop: A Store Worthy of the Nation's Capital," will be available for sale and signing by the author. No reservations are required, and the program is free. Centennial Snipit: Creating the Town's Vibrant Community Asset

The Jane E. Lawton Community Recreation Center serves as center of activities for Town residents. But the 3.7 acre parcel in the "Leland" subdivision was first home to Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School, fronting 44th Street. When BCC moved to its current location in 1936, the building became Leland Junior High School for 7th-9th graders from Bethesda, Chevy Chase and Kensington. It reached peak enrollment in 1963, but declining numbers of students led to its closure in 1981.

During the next eight years, Town residents worked with State and County officials to convert the school site into a multi-service community center. The path from closed school to park and community center was not easy -- it took community commitment, creative ideas, patience, political will and grit! Town resident Jane E. Lawton played a significant role in the process. The Leland Community Recreation Center opened in June 1989.

In June 2009, the Center was renamed in honor of Jane Lawton following her death. The Lawton Center is a vibrant community asset. It serves as an example of what can happen when residents and government work together to solve complex problems.
