Mayor's Message

Scott Fosler

Let me first thank my fellow Council members for their confidence in electing me to serve as mayor of the Town for the coming year. And I would like to thank everyone who voted in the recent Town election, and all of the candidates, who ran strong and substantive campaigns. We had a record turnout of 1115 voters this year, and a lively conversation focused on the best ways to achieve an emerging consensus on our top priorities as a community. Democracy at its best.

And on behalf of the entire Town, I want to thank our dedicated departing council members for all they have contributed to the Town. Kathy Strom served for ten years on the Town Council, including three times as mayor. Al Lang served for eight years, including the past year as mayor. And Vicky Taplin served for two years. Together these three citizens served a total of 20 years on the council, volunteering countless hours and their abundant talents in service to the Town.

At our May meeting the Council voted unanimously to create two new Special Committees, on the Bethesda Downtown Plan and on Purple Line Mitigation. This will focus Town efforts on two of the most important issues that we must address over the next year, and which will affect our community far into the future.

My wife, Gail, and I love living in our Town, now as empty nesters, sharing so many experiences with friends and neighbors, and heartened by the arrival of new folks who bring fresh eyes, minds, and hearts – and a whole new generation of kids. We are enormously grateful for the kindnesses that have been shown us, and look forward to working with everyone on the common challenges we confront.

Public Hearing on Bethesda Downtown Plan Legal Assistance

At its June 8 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposal to engage a law firm to assist the Town in continuing to respond to the proposed Bethesda Downtown Plan and its local impacts.

As development of the plan progresses, the Town Council wants to ensure that our concerns are given serious consideration by both the Planning Board and the Montgomery County Council. Accordingly, the Council has proposed to engage a law firm to assist in that effort. The length of the engagement will be approximately 7 months, to coincide with final approval of the sector plan by the County Council, with an estimated cost between \$40,000 and \$55,000.

Volunteer for Town Boards & Committees

Dear Neighbor,

Our Town has a rich array of boards and committees through which the enormous talent and dedication of our residents is pooled and channeled into various Town and community activities. Let me give you a brief description of these, note a couple of changes the Council has made, and invite you to consider volunteering for them.

The Council shared its thinking on creating two new Special Committees on the Bethesda Downtown Plan and on Purple Line Mitigation in a recent *Town Crier* post, and I would encourage you to visit Town website for more detailed information. The two new special committees will not alter the basic structure of the Town's five standing committees, other than shifting principal responsibility for the Bethesda Sector Plan from the Long Range Planning Committee to the Special Committee on the Bethesda Downtown Plan. Meanwhile, the work of the existing Ad Hoc Purple Line Mitigation Committee will be folded into the Special Committee on Purple Line Mitigation.

Each year in June, the Town Council begins the process of seeking volunteers for the Town's standing committees and filling vacancies on the Town boards and commission. We encourage you to consider volunteering for one of these bodies so we can involve as many residents as possible in Town affairs.

In July, I will appoint, with the advice of the Town Council, residents to serve on each of the Town's five standing committees for a period of one year beginning in September. Following is a list of the committees, including a short description of each:

- **Climate and Environment:** Inspires and facilitates energy conservation and environmental stewardship by the Town and its residents.
- **Community Relations:** Encourages a strong sense of neighborliness through community activities and communications.
- **Land Use:** Guides building and redevelopment within the Town through the use of available planning tools.
- **Long-Range Planning:** Identifies, emerging issues that require longer-term planning and analysis. The Council is also considering asking this committee to take on greater responsibility for monitoring activities in county and state government likely to impact our Town.
- **Public services:** Advocates high-quality Town services for our residents.


I will also appoint two residents to serve on the Town's Election Board, one resident to serve on the Town's Ethics Commission, and one resident to serve on the Water Board. Following are brief descriptions of these bodies:

- **Election Board:** Oversees all Town elections, including making appropriate provisions for nominations, printing ballots, appointing tellers and/or judges and supervising the polls.
- **Ethics Commission:** Receives, verifies and maintains all financial disclosure forms required by the State of Maryland.
- **Water Board:** Hears requests by property owners who have had a water drainage plan denied by the Town.

If you are interested in volunteering to serve on any of the Town's committees, boards or commission, please submit a brief note expressing your interest to the Town Office **by June 30, 2016**. Your correspondence may be submitted in person, by mail or by e-mail to townoffice@townofchevy Chase.org and should include your name, address, telephone number, e-mail address and a few sentences about why you would like to serve on that particular body.

On behalf of the entire Council, I would like to extend a special thanks to all of you who have served on one of these bodies over the past year. The dedication of your time and talents provides an invaluable resource to the Town and continues to strengthen and improve our community.

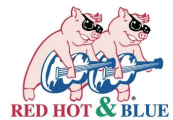
CELEBRATE ON THE FOURTH
